CaroleMc: I have also begun a discussion topic for you, and you'd be very welcome to add something there while you're waiting, and certainly after the event.

CaroleMc: Hello all, this is definitely the right place for digital storytelling today.

DianneA: Ok I think we are ready to go ...

DianneA: so let me make my formal introduction ..

CaroleMc: Yes I'm ready

DianneA: Welcome to Festival 2007, Playing to Learn. This session is being led by one of our international members Carole MCulloch from Australia. CaroleMc: The DST phenomenon has become really popular amongst our primary, secondary and tertiary education teachers

CaroleMc: Question for everyone: please describe what education sector you are from?

DianneA: I am in 'professional development' Carole

DoloresG: Elementary K-8

DorethiaM: I teach middle school resource(special ed students)

ChristinS4: Elementary Special Education Teacher in a 5th Grade Inclusion Class

SherryC1: I teach 8th grade English and Social Studies

SusanLC: Secondary English Language Arts

RitaSo: Elementary K-4

KarenAro: Private language consultant

ShayneTr: visual arts and computer teacher, studying special ed last two summers

DianeKR: public high school, intensive reading

CelesteR: 10-12 history

CaroleMc: Thanks for your responses, I see quite a few in the elementary and secondary system. Is anyone from higher ed- community colleges etc?

DianneA: quite a range!

VickiLM: higher ed - technology trainer and adjunct for education department

SherylM: Teacher; Professional Development, parent, Science, Elem Sped

DianneA: I fluff around in higher ed

SusanLC: LOL

CaroleMc: Excellent, I think I will have something for everyone today. IMHO

CaroleMc: IMHO = in my humble opinion

DianneA: university, pre-service teachers and more recently masters by course work

CaroleMc: Question 2 for everyone: what experience have you had with digital

storytelling in your teaching or learning so far?

ChristinS4: none

DianeKR: not much, but very interested

DoloresG: none

KarenAro: none

RitaSo: some

DianneA: storytelling I understand, I am not sure about the 'digital' appellation

CelesteR: not much, but interested

SherryC1: none

VickiLM: I began using it with pre-service teachers last year

CaroleMc: Okay, then I should begin with a definition of DST and how it can be used in

teaching. Would that be okay?

DianneA: with the recent masters folk it was 'narrative research'

SusanLC: Took a writing project workshop, Made it a project in Creative writing. Took

a PhilWP workshop, made it a project in creative writing

CaroleMc: okay I'll just point you to my Digital Storytelling Network where you can see

part of that definition.....

CaroleMc: http://www.groups.edna.edu.au/course/view.php?id=107

CaroleMc: okay the definition that we use is on the left side of that Moodle web site....

CaroleMc: Digital storytelling is an engaging process for telling personal narratives, building learning materials; communicating with networks; adding value and media to portfolios; as well as a captivating tool for capturing and sharing project, team and organisational knowledge.

CaroleMc: This web site is one of a few that I'll take you to today - so I hope you're prepared for multi tasking - she says with a smile

ChristinS4: I can multi-task away... the toddler is sleeping:)

CaroleMc: I believe that DST is a wonderful tool for teaching and today I'll explore the reasons why with you

CaroleMc: Today I'm planning to take you on a journey to explore ways in which you can embed the practice of DST into your teaching.....

CaroleMc: I've attached some files for you to browse in the Files section

CaroleMc: and I have created a space for you to explore in the Digitales wikispace at:

CaroleMc: take a minute to open up that new wiki page and let me know if you can see it by saying YES here

DianeKR: yes

SusanLC: yes

CaroleMc: Scroll down a little and you'll see a diagram of my journey in DST

so far....

CaroleMc: Let me explain some of those milestones for you....

CaroleMc: 2003 - first DST conference held in Cardiff, Wales, where I was born ...

CaroleMc: 2004 - began a PD program for teachers in DST at the Australian Centre for Moving Image, funded by my then employer TAFE frontiers...

CaroleMc: 2005 - created the first DST Network for Aussie teachers funded by the Aust Flexible Learning Framework....

CaroleMc: 2006 - coordinated a program for the use of DST in rural Victoria for learners in a basic ICT course...

CaroleMc: 2007 - participated in a funded research project called Embedding innovative practices

RitaSo: what's VET

CaroleMc: Good question Rita VET here in Australia is Vocational Education and Training

CaroleMc: Is there anything in that intro that doesn't make sense for you? OR Would you like me to expand on any of those milestones?

SusanLC: A swiftly growing movement!

SherylM: Like this nation wide emphasis

CaroleMc: For instance you may not be familiar with TAFE - this stands for Technical and Further Education - these colleges operate like USA community colleges.

CaroleMc: Yes Sheryl, that is my focus right now - as DST has become a popular method across Australia

CaroleMc: I wonder if you've all seen a digital story or two before? Can you describe it for me? Perhaps some example from Rusthton's session.

CaroleMc: For those who have not yet immersed themselves in DST, I'll take you to a few for viewing today.

SusanLC: great!

CelesteR: Okay, Rushton's session...and I saw a super presentation...sort of like a Scrapbook on Mark Twain...and that is what I think of with Digital Storytelling.

RitaSo: personal narratives

CaroleMc: Yes, Rushton, actually described the process of creating a digital story (a movie) using software called MovieMaker 2 and iMovie.

SusanLC: My students illustrated poems about family and place and narrated

CaroleMc: Exactly the sort of thing I mean Susan and Rita

CaroleMc: What do you think is the power of these digital stories?

SusanLC: they become sensual and intimate on many levels

ShayneTr: Combination of technology tools and personal connection

RitaSo: The images and the weaving of text to tell a story

CamiC: I think it gives students who might not write well, or who don't like to speak in front of people an outlet and way to have a voice

SusanLC: They learned economy and simplicity in editing for great impact

CaroleMc: absolutely, I agree with all of the above...

SusanLC: And they had a product they could keep

ShavneTr: or share

RitaSo: And be proud of

CaroleMc: have you also considered its power to inspire, motivate and encapsulate cultural issues?

SusanLC: I gave them each little zip drives with their work

SusanLC: explain. I think so

CaroleMc: this is the effect of the first example I'll show you today

CaroleMc: The next stop for us on our tour is highlighted for you in the wiki as DST Tour Stop 1

CaroleMc: http://www.fraynework.com.au/02 productions/video/desert.html

DianneA: Stories allow for connections to be made with other experience

DianneA: and prompt new ideas for me

CaroleMc: Take a moment to visit this site and listen to the voice that should start straight away, the visuals may take a little longer to load...

SusanLC: sensual and intimate: magnetic, straight to the heart!

CaroleMc: come back and let me know if you could see and hear how this DST is emphasizing the Reconciliation issues.

SusanLC: I watched it earlier to prep. ouch

CaroleMc: good on you Susan, any other comments you'd make about its impact on you?

ScottLy: it sounds and looks great.

VickiLM: Very well done.

CaroleMc: There are many stories in this Fraynework site - and they all focus on the issues faced by our indigenous peoples.

SusanLC: I know "reconciliation" thru Quakers and systems of justice. Is that what you are speaking of?

CaroleMc: Can you see how these could be used in education activities for learners in elementary or secondary schools?

ScottLy: very powerful

SusanLC: Telling stories of ourselves is the beginning of every civil rights progress

ShayneTr: They would certainly enrich the curriculum!

CaroleMc: Yes, it is a social justice issue for our aboriginal people in Australia - one that has huge impact on their ability to feel safe once more on their own land.

SusanLC: Finding voice, people hearing/seeing/pausing

CaroleMc: Thanks for the feedback, I hope you are beginning to see just how powerful the use of DST can be in education. Let's move on....

CelesteR: This reminds me of a video presented by another Australian to Atlanta children last year, can't remember where it is in my bookmarks

DoloresG: Wow, I just finished it.

SusanLC: Two of my students might testify to that as well, it happened without planning it to happen because they said what they wanted from their own locations

CaroleMc: Please scroll down further in the wiki page to read a little more about the stories of the indigenous peoples....

VickiLM: Reminds me of some of the slave narratives, but most of those are audio only. So much more impact with the video as well.

SusanLC: Course, getting computer lab time and teaching time was not the easiest. . . .

CaroleMc: Let's take another DST Tour Stop, scroll down a little more and you'll find a link to our Designing Elearning site at:

SusanLC: . . . but some hear also run the Labs!

CaroleMc: Let me know when you can see this site and please scroll to select a specific example you'd like to view..

SusanLC: yes

ShavneTr: yes

DoloresG: yes

ChristinS4: yes

VickiLM: yes

CaroleMc: In each example you'll notice that there is some text and a story and a map...

KarenAro: yes, selected e-learning

CaroleMc: Okay, after you've selected the sample, click on the story icon...

ScottLy: computer information

CaroleMc: these may take a while to load properly, but they each have their own control buttons

CamiC: got it

CaroleMc: You may wish to explore these in depth on conclusion of the presentation....

KarenAro: really interesting that you have the story, the map and the transcript!

CelesteR: I love all of the examples. I feel like a child.. "how can I do this as a teacher?" I wonder

CaroleMc: the reason I'm showing you this site is to give you a picture of how we're actually embedding the digital story into the learning environment.

CaroleMc: This particular resource was developed 2 years ago by some of my colleagues at TAFE frontiers and is continually being refined.

CaroleMc: do you have any other comments you'd like to make about this resource?

ChristinS4: If they can do it... we can do it

CaroleMc: Yes, Celeste, it is enticing and engaging.

CelesteR: I'm envious

CaroleMc: Yes Christine, it is not difficult to do

CelesteR: all those eeee's

DianneA wonders about the time involved

CaroleMc: Okay, let's come back to the wiki page when you've finished exploring the designing elearning site....

CelesteR Two years?

CaroleMc: Hmmm, time taken to produce this whole site was 12 months, time taken to produce each story would have been a few days.

CamiC: are these resources available to us at any time. I like the elearning, as I am helping to develop courses for our district

CaroleMc: You can produce a digital story yourself with easy to use free software in a matter of hours.

CamiC: online hs

CaroleMc: Yes, Cami we'd be delighted for you to make use of the Desiging Elearning site any time.

CelesteR sigh, Did I hear free software?

DianneA: yes Cami, you should be able to access this from the transcript and then from adding it to your favourites

CamiC: ty

CaroleMc: Yes, the whole thrust for our embedding of innovative practices was to ensure that the software being advocated was free....

VickiLM: yeah!

DoloresG: good

CaroleMc: Photo Story 3 a Microsoft product is a free download and teachers really love it here in Aust.

DianneA: excellent strategy ... makes things that much more accessible

ChristinS4: My co-worker created a digital story project with the students @ her elementary school http://www.herricks.org/webpages/tms/family.cfm?subpage=8261

CaroleMc: This is certainly a strong criteria for considering if an innovation can be embedded in your teaching practice - its free - its easy.

ChristinS4: You can check it out later

CaroleMc: Thanks for sharing that one Christine, let's take a moment to visit that site.

CaroleMc: I've loaded the one about Michelles necklace - I love the voice

CaroleMc: what age is Michelle?

ChristinS4: I think these are 4th or 5th grade students

CaroleMc: This is a great example to show how powerful a DST can be to empower young students to express themselves.

ShayneTr: her family must have loved seeing that!

CamiC: wow and I am looking at Margarets Great Grandfather, what an awesome job!

CaroleMc: This sort of DST methodology is being adopted in our Aust primary schools too

CaroleMc: learners from grade 3 - grade 6 are using DST for their eportfolios...

CaroleMc: they can use their finished DSTs as part of their own learning journey to reflect on

CaroleMc: Thanks Dianne - let's move on a little.

CaroleMc: Would you go back to the wiki space and scroll a little more please

CelesteR I'm in awe and inspired.

CaroleMc: I've put in some extra information there about the research that we did in 2006..

CelesteR: So once we download Microsoft, I can easily embed videos to my website, am I thinking right?

CaroleMc: Yes, Celeste, you're absolutely right. Look for Photo story 3 at the microsoft site.

CelesteR Hugging you

CaroleMc: Last year I participated in this research called embedding innovative practices...

CaroleMc: and those eight key findings came out of it, among other things....

CaroleMc: Which one of those eight key finding resonate for you?

ChristinS4: purposeful use of technology is a core competency in a knowledge society

ShayneTr: purposeful use of technology is a core competency in a knowledge society - I try to teach this in my computer class and even art class

CaroleMc: yes Christine, and how many of our teachers include it in their teaching I wonder? what percentage do you think

ChristinS4: This is the comment we make over and over again to parents as to why we want their students to use the computer at home and in school

VickiLM: At this time very few are using it in our area.

ChristinS4: 15% b/c the teachers are scared of the technology

ShayneTr: There are teachers at my school who are actually proud of never missing a computer. Young teachers. I don't get it??

CaroleMc: what strategies could enhance the % of teachers using technology?

ChristinS4: I teach teachers in my district and they are afraid

CelesteR: Achievement through technology is part of our school's mission statement...but I am on crutches.

DoloresG: Purposeful use of technology is a core competency in a knowledge society - I, too, teach this in computer class -

CelesteR: Only one computer in the classroom for 32 students

VickiLM: I agree - what are their students going to do without computer knowledge in the "real" world?

CamiC: It takes a lot more work to use technology effectively to support your curriculum, not just for the sake of using it

DavidWek . o O (crutches are technology)

CaroleMc: Here in Australia we have a national funding framework that provides thousands of dollars for professional development in the use of elearning, mlearning and social networking tools.

ShayneTr: I think that they would need to see "product" and be impressed. DST would certainly make an impact.

ChristinS4: I wouldn't know what to do anymore w/out technology

VickiLM: I agree

KarenAro: I know the strategy I have used with my folks at age 70 to learn computer skills - perceived benefit

ChristinS4: The teachers need to play to learn... but they are scared and they have limited time

CaroleMc: Yes, I note the barriers and challenges that still exist for teachers - and we have those too, we have moved beyond them to push the technology usage with our Australian teachers, it has become an essential skill set that all must aspire to

SusanLC: Economically, this is going to make who is prepped for higher ed and the work force limited to systems that provide?

ChristinS4: What do you bribe them with? LOL

KarenAro: available time and competing priorities are limiting factors for engaging with e-learning innovations ring a bell for me - I wish the day had at least 30 hours

SusanLC: And yet w/o tech, learning still happens

CamiC: Our whole building is getting smart boards and projectors, but I cringe at the people who don't use it effectively

CaroleMc: Exactly Christine - it is all about play to learn - I'm beginning to substitute the word 'research' for play - just to be more accountable to the bean counters - she says with a sigh

DoloresG: I will remember that word - research.

DianneA: Carole, put play back in ... about time the researchers remembered what they really do!

CaroleMc: Thanks for the ideas here about

CamiC: But it is all about training and being open minded when it comes to training.

SusanLC: research/play is a concept that I teach in class, students think I'mcrazy

CaroleMc: bribery, effective communications, attitudes, and pushing the boundaries

CaroleMc: Let's move on a little further, shall we?

CaroleMc: I've also provided a set of tools that you may find useful for embedding DST into your teaching....

CaroleMc: Please scroll a little more in the wiki space and you'll see that I've highlighted these 3 documents for Part A, B and C of the research....

SusanLC: the URL?

ShayneTr: Is that what is listed in the resources for the discussion?

ChristinS4 joined the room.

CaroleMc: Yes, this same trio of documents are located in the files featured in this room.

SusanLC: where's the WIKI?

CaroleMc: Please do help yourself to these when convenient and use them to consider the key questions required for the embedding process to take place.

SusanLC: thanks

DianneA: Good strategy again, Carole

CaroleMc: What I'd like to do for the remaining 10 minutes is ask one or two of the questions from Part A that might resonate for you. that okay?

ChristinS4: aok

CaroleMc: oh are we at the end of our time already?

DianneA: then you can spend time with those who want to stay some more ... time goes so quickly when we are having fun

CaroleMc: an innovation like digital storytelling that is adaptable to a range of contexts, easy to use, costs little, places small demands on the infrastructure, and demonstrates immediate benefits - is a FORMULA for successful embedding.

CaroleMc: would you agree with this and why?

ShayneTr: Thanks Carole

SusanLC: Yes

ScottLy: Thank you for the information!

CaroleMc: you are most welcome, glad you could join me.

DavidWek: Great discussion, Carole. Well done

CelesteR: I would agree because it leaves space for other needed materials and time-consuming issues

SusanR: A truly "enjoyable" session

SusanLC: if you add teacher time to pre-plan, great stretches of diverse learning take place and lots of pride

CelesteR: Thanks so much to all for sharing!
